The Service of Light

The service begins in the courtyard. All will be given an unlit hand-held candle as we gather around the new Paschal Candle.

The Lighting of the Paschal Candle

Dear friends in Christ: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus passed over from death to life, the Church invites her members, dispersed throughout the world, to gather in vigil and prayer. For this is the Passover of the Lord, in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his Sacraments, we share in his victory over death.

Let us pray. O God, through your Son you have bestowed upon your people the brightness of your light: Sanctify this new fire, and grant that in this Paschal feast we may so burn with heavenly desires, that with pure minds we may attain to the festival of everlasting light; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Celebrant marks the Paschal Candle with the sign of the cross, saying,

Christ yesterday and today,
the Beginning and the End,

The Celebrant then traces the Alpha and Omega into the Paschal Candle, saying,

Alpha and Omega.

The Celebrant traces the year into the Paschal Candle, saying,

His are the times and ages.
To him be glory and dominion
through all ages of eternity. **Amen.**


The Celebrant places five grains of incense, one each into the four points and center of the cross on the Paschal Candle, saying,

Through his holy and glorious wounds may Christ the Lord guard and preserve us.

The Celebrant lights the Paschal Candle from the New Fire, saying,

May the light of Christ gloriously rising dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.

This is the night, when Christ broke the bonds of death and hell, and rose victorious from the grave.

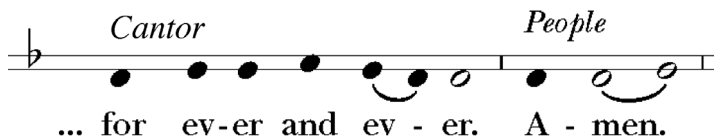



Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.


